### Background

The European alliance system had worked to provide security to member states, but alliances were exclusive.

Wilson rejected the alliance system.

Instead, Wilson spoke about a community of nations working together to prevent and resist aggression.

Peace loving nations would use arbitration to solve disputes.

The threat of collective action from all members of the League of Nations would be enough to deter aggressors.

When things got nasty, economic sanctions from all members of the League of Nations would force aggressors to abandon their ambitions.

This was a crystal-clear expression of rationalism!
